1 Review the AT&T Connected Learning technology basics and digital literacy [materials](#).

2 Choose the topics you want to teach.

Think of yourself as a digital inclusion community ambassador. Which topics did you find fascinating? You'll be the most successful at teaching a topic that captures your enthusiasm/interest.

3 Brainstorm — be creative!

- How can you reach people in your community who could benefit from this information?
- How can you make it interesting?
- What online activities are important in your community? Can you connect any of these topics to those activities?

Think of relevant stories and examples. Adults learn best when they want or need to learn about something, and when the lessons are phrased in the context of experience-oriented situations.

4 Create a written plan.

The plan should include:

- A target learner audience and number of target learners
- Outreach strategy/methods
- Project timeline
- Funding needs

Do you want to teach these concepts in person or virtually? Do you prefer classroom, formal, structured or on-the-spot training? Do you want to use the examples in the provided presentation slides, do a live demonstration, or take a hybrid approach? How will you spread the word and promote your efforts? What help will you need from your mentor?

5 Make it happen!

Be curious, be confident, and make the information relevant and entertaining. Be a change-maker focused on digital inclusion so your neighbors gain the skills and confidence to be successful in the digital world.

6 Check on learning.
